### Implementation Status and Key Decisions

**Overall Implementation Progress.** The program has made significant achievements, most notably creating a solid platform for multi-sectoral, decentralized implementation modalities. The program has established one of Ethiopia's best-functioning multi-sectoral program and brings education, health, water and finance sectors together to respond to the gap in WaSH services. It has strengthened the government's implementation capacity for WaSH through establishing WaSH governance, coordination, management and implementation structures at all levels. The Program has introduced a coordinated programmatic approach in the WaSH sector and laid the system of one plan, one budget, and one reporting arrangement that is fully aligned with government system in using fiduciary, safeguards, and monitoring and evaluation arrangements. The program also served as a platform for leveraging resource for the sector as major donors in the sector (DFID, AfDB, UNICEF, and Finland Government) have pooled their resources to finance the government flagship program. It has also attracted additional donors willing to join the CWA

including European Investment Fund, Saudi Investment Fund, French Development Agency, and KOICA that leveraged more resource to the WASH sector, about 33% increase so far.

For the most part, Rural and institutional WASH components of the program have met or exceeded targets. Progress for urban WASH, however, has been slower than anticipated and it is unlikely to meet all program targets by the anticipated closing date of June 2020. There has been a concerted effort to expedite implementation and 51 out of the total 115 towns are completed (49 small and 2 medium). 44 out of 71 small towns and 8 of the 20 medium towns are currently under implementation.

**Rural Water Supply.** As a result of Program interventions, 3.91 million people (102.5% of Program targets) have access to improved water supply. 17,190 schemes are operational out of which 15,089 new schemes, 214 expansions and 2,032 schemes were rehabilitated.

**Rural sanitation:** 1,221,638 household (HH) (200%) of the target beneficiaries have constructed improved latrines. Though the data for rural HH sanitation is subject to verification, the reported achievement thus far exceeds program targets. Since the start of the Program a total of 4,311 Kebeles in the CWA program Woredas (out of a total of 9,343) have been declared as "Open Defecation Free".

**Institutional WaSH:** Institutional WaSH has achieved 98.5 percent of its target and created access to water supply and sanitation facilities to 10, 224 schools and Health Facilities (HFs) out of the planned 10,380. WaSH in HFs exceeded its target for both the provision of water supply and sanitation facilities at 157 and 140 percent respectively. Construction of sanitation facilities in HFs includes waste disposal facilities (incinerators, septic tanks and placenta pits). Construction of school sanitation facilities has also exceeded its target (103 percent). Menstrual and Hygiene Management (MHM) has been included as a package in school sanitation and substantial numbers of MHM rooms have also been constructed that benefited adolescent girls in Program-targeted schools. The education sector managed to provide water supply and hand washing facilities to 49 percent of the targeted schools, while 128 new water supply schemes are under different stages of construction using government counterpart financing that need proactive follow up by the respective regions to ensure the facilities are completed and functional.

**Urban WaSH component:** So far only 52% of the urban WASH target is achieved. 49 small towns and 2 medium towns have been completed benefiting 780,000 people. Water Supply system construction for 19 small and one medium town is above 75% while 16 small towns and four medium towns are between 50-75%. Remaining one small and four medium towns are below 50%. All small towns and most of the medium towns are expected to be completed by December 2020. Despite the delays in implementation of this component there has been an effort to speed up procurement process and increase progress of urban water supply development. However, the impact of COVID 19 pandemic and subsequent lock down in many countries is affecting: i) timely shipment and delivery of imported items such as pipes and fittings, and electromechanical equipment that costs around US\$ 11 million; ii) civil works (pipes and EM related activities) because of delayed delivery; and iii) ability of contractors and consultants to deploy full capacity staff to the site due to travel and other restrictions. The progress so far is:

- Small towns: 49 of the 124 small towns have been completed and 44 are under construction. The 21 remaining towns that were identified under this project were provided with TA to establish governance structures (e.g. water board), prepare business plans, finalize study and design of their respective water supply systems. For some of these small towns source development was also completed and financed through program funds. Financing of civil works of proposed water supply schemes will not be financed due to lack of resources and readiness and may be considered for financing under Phase II of CWA (upon meeting readiness criteria).
- *Medium towns:* Of the 20 towns, 2 are completed, 8 are under construction, and one contract (Chencha) has been canceled. Documentation and formal submission for cancelation of the Chencha contract through STEP is submitted. It is also agreed that government will notify the World Bank on the planned way forward for Chencha. The remaining 9 are still in engineering design phase and due to complexity of the works will not be financed under this program,. Cost escalations have also contributed in the decision to not finance remaining medium towns under this project.

**Urban sanitation:** 379 public and communal latrines were constructed under the program, 199 public and 180 communal, benefiting 71,146 and 6,746 people respectively. Given the concerns regarding operation and management mechanisms that require concerted attention to ensure sustainability of these facilities, a recommendation to halt construction of new facilities was made to address O&M and sustainability of installed infrastructure. The Ministry of Health and Ministry of Water, Irrigation and Energy are exploring mechanisms to improve the operation and maintenance of these facilities.

**Program management. Program management.** All critical positions are filled at federal and regional WASH sector PMUs including NWCO. 82% of the approved staff are on board. As the same PMU will be retained for Phase II, recruitment process for vacant positions is also underway. High staff turnover, however, continues to be a challenge. Various training and capacity building interventions are conducted and about 13,724 WASH experts from federal, regional, and woreda WASH units have received different levels of technical training. Continuous training is needed to ensure newly recruited staff are provided with adequate orientation to support program implementation.

• **Program Completion Report (PCR)** is under preparation by the National WASH Coordination Office in collaboration with the respective regional Coordination Offices and regional and federal PMUs. So far five regions have submitted their draft PCR. Though extension is to be granted, agreement is reached for the process to go as scheduled and have the draft report ready by the end of May. Progress on the urban component will be included and the PCR will be updated during the extension period.
