Women, Business and Women, Business and the Law (WBL) 2022 presents an index covering 190 economies, structured around the life cycle of a working woman. In total, 35 questions are scored across eight indicators. Burkina Faso scores 82 out of 100, while the regional average across Sub-Saharan Africa is 73 .
