WAGE TRENDS IN INDIA: 1830 to 1976 - AN
ANALYSIS, DISCUSSION AND COMPILATION OF DATA.

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This paper assembles data on wages in India from different sources. The first part of the paper provides an analyses of the trends in wages. The second part explains the nature and scope of the data available from different sources. The third part contains the statistical tables.

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PART - I

WAGE TRENDS IN INDIA: 1830-1976

It is difficult to trace the wage movements in India before 1830. There are scattered studies relating to particular periods for the last 150 years. It is not found possible to build up a time-series by linking them together because of certain vital gaps in them. However, a descriptive review of these studies gives a broad picture for the entire period 1830-1860: The period witnessed the building up of railways, establishment of tea and coffee plantations and the beginning of modern industries. According to Buchanan^{1/} there occurred during this period a doubling of wages of coolies and carpenters in certain areas. As these figures are in money terms and the period witnessed a considerable increase in prices, it is difficult to be sure of the real income position of the workers. Dadabhai Naoroji^{2/} quoted official data to show that wages of unskilled labour in Bengal remained at the same level in 1830/31 and 1866/67. In his other book^{3/}, he pointed out that the increase in wages was local and temporary depending upon such conditions as the establishment of plantations, the building of railways, the starting of factories, opening of mines etc. undertaken by the Government after the mutiny.

1860-1873:


Again according to Buchanan, wages of coolies and carpenters were slightly less in 1892 than in 1860 whereas wages in cotton and jute mills remained at the same level since 1860. In the district of Tipperah the wages of blacksmith or carpenter were doubled in 1870 as compared to 1850 while prices went up by 3 times.^{4/}

1873-1900:

Indices of money and real wages of carpenter, syce and agricultural labour for the period have been taken from the data given in Trends of Wages in India (1873-1900) published by D. Bhattacharya in Artha Vijñana, September 1965. The data are given in Table 1.1. The mean deviation of regional indices in each year is also shown in the same table. The bulk of the data used in Bhattacharya's article was taken from the official series of Prices and Wages in India.^{10/} Half-yearly information collected by Tahsildars on wages formed the basis of the returns submitted by Collectors to the Director of Agriculture in each province. These data, after examination in the office of the Director of Agriculture, were published in the provincial gazette. From these half-yearly data, a series of comparative figures for selected (but not typical) districts in each province were published annually in the Prices and Wages in India since 1884 with data from 1873. The All-India average wage rates for the three categories of workers were obtained by Bhattacharya as simple averages of provisional figures for the half-year ending December 31. The money wage indices given in Table 1.1 are based on this wage data. Bhattacharya obtained the real wage indices by deflating the money wages with the unweighted price index of foodgrains (base 1873=100). The price indices were compiled from Index Number of Indian Prices, 1861-1918 issued by the Department of Statistics, India. The pooled wage rates were obtained as the weighted average of the wage rates of the three categories of workers. The weights used were the respective All-India population supported by these occupations in 1891 as per census. The money wages grew slowly and


TREND IN MONEY WAGES 1873 TO 1900

steadily during the period while price index of foodgrains grew slowly with violent fluctuations (Graph 1). The sharp fluctuations in foodgrain prices were due to famines in the years 1877-1879, 1897 and 1900 and drought in 1892. Prices had no bearing on money wages. The regression result in appendix established the fact. These fluctuations in foodgrain prices induced violent fluctuations in the real wage rates (Graph 2) and on the whole there was a slight declining trend in real wages during the period. The real wage rates of the three categories of workers fluctuated in a very similar manner and are just in opposite direction to the movements of price index of foodgrains. In the years of severe famine (1877-79) and prolonged drought (1892) there was a sharp drop in real wages. Wages fell due to famine in the years 1897 and 1900 (see Table 1.7). An examination of the mean deviation of regional indices makes it clear that between regions, disparities in wage rates increased during 1873-1900 for mason, carpenter or blacksmith; for syce or horse keeper the regional disparity increased at the end of the period while no such trend is found in the wage rates of agricultural labourers.

In spite of a well known expansion of employment potential economic activities like railway construction, public works, plantation, jute and cotton textile and other industries, there was a downward trend in real wages. The employment generated in these activities was a smaller fraction of the total labour force and the unemployment created due to a decline in traditional crafts industry was high. Increase in foodgrains prices, not only attracted unemployed people in traditional crafts towards cultivation but also brought the real wages down. But these alone probably do not explain the sharp decline in wages over years.

K.L. Dutta^{5/} rejected bulk of the data compiled in Prices and Wages in India as unreliable. He remarked that the method of compilation was faulty and the remuneration of agricultural labourers paid partly at least in kind was difficult to account. He also quoted in support of his view, a number of officials who went on to say that the decline recorded in the real wages was unreal. On the basis of official data, Buchanan observed that wages for both agricultural and skilled labour remained remarkably stable during the eighteen years--1873 to 1891 and there was slight increase in factory wages during 1873-1895. Occurrence of a famine over a considerable area raised the price level in the country and brought down the real wages.^{6/} This perhaps explains partly the sharp fluctuations in real wages. But Bhattacharya viewed that rural wages during 1873 to 1900 remained stationary.

1897-1912

For this period, the data on wages were obtained from K.L. Dutta.^{5/} The average real wage indices (base 1892=100) in industries compiled by Dutta are given in Table 1.2. The data show sharp fluctuations in real income; but on the whole there appears a slight upward trend in real wages (see Graph 3).

1914-1944

The Labour Office of the Government of Bombay conducted enquiries into wages of labour in the cotton textile industry in 1921 and 1923.^{7/} According to this enquiry, the index of real earnings (base 1914=100) for all workers in Bombay went up to 117 in May 1921 and 126 in August 1923. The report of the Royal Commission on Labour in India (1931) observed that


a sharp rise in prices took place towards and after the end of the first world war and there was general rise in wages in 1920 and 1921. The Commission also observed that prices reached a peak level in the autumn of 1920 and the general tendency thereafter was downwards, so that by 1923, the workers were generally better off than before the war.

The above two sources indicate that there was some rise in wages in the early twenties. However, they relate to a very short period and do not give any definite evidence on wage movements in the inter-war period as a whole. Money and real wage indices given by Ramgopal Agarwala^{8/} are presented in Table 1.3. He computed the indices from the data given by S.P. Saksena.^{9/} Saksena gave year by year figures of money wages and cost of living indices for a number of industrial centres for the period 1914-1935. Agarwala assumed that the wage and cost of living indices of the industrial centres represent the wage and cost of living indices of the provinces in which they were situated. In case of more than one industrial centre in a province, a simple average of the indices at different centres was taken. The All-India index was obtained by combining the State indices using the weights in proportion to employment in different States. The employment figures were obtained from Statistical Abstract of British India, 14th issue. The regression result given in the Appendix shows that the speed of adjustment of money wages to prices was slow.

From Graph 4, it is clear that upto 1929 there was no trend in real wages, though there were some fluctuations. After 1929, there was an upward trend in real wages; but obviously this was due to the falling prices during the Great Depression and adjustment of money wages in the downward direction was slower than that in the upward direction.

(BASE 1892=100)




TREND IN MONEY AND REAL WAGES IN INDUSTRIES 1914 TO 1935

(BASE 1909-13-100)







After the publication Prices and Wages in India discontinued in 1923, published data on agricultural wages in one form or the other was available only for a few provinces, like C.P. and Berar, Bombay (annual data) and Punjab (quinquennial data). N. Rath and R.V. Joshi^{11/} obtained wage data for skilled, unskilled and field labour for Bombay Presidency for the years 1924 to 1940, from the annual Administration Reports of the Bombay Presidency. The movements of wages in the three sub-divisions and the Presidency are shown in Graphs 5 to 8 (the supporting data are not given in the article) In each of the three divisions as well as in the whole presidency, the decline in wages during the period from around 1928-31 was not as sharp as the prices of Jowar and Bazra. The decline in wages was considerable and the decline continued long after the decline in prices ceased. Thereafter the wages started recovering slowly. The adjustment of wage level to the low price level was slow. The price level began to rise above the wage-level since 1938. The continuous lag of agricultural wages behind prices during 1911 to 1944 was also observed by Chaturvedi^{14/} on the basis of the quinquennial wage-data for united provinces. After 1944, he observed, the rise in wages was less than the rise in prices.

1939-1976

Under the payment of Wages Act 1936, data on annual money earnings of factory workers earning less than Rs. 200 per month were collected for the period 1939-1964. The data are given in Table 1.4. The real wage indices have been obtained by deflating the money wage indices with Consumer Price Index for industrial workers. There is no trend in real wages

(see Graph 9). The speed of adjustment of money wages to rising prices was low but significant. As the data pertain to a portion of the total work force and this portion was changing during the period, the usefulness of these data is limited to draw any conclusions on wage trends. Also the coverage of fringe benefits was not consistent during the period.


On April 1, 1958 the payment of Wages Act was extended to include all workers earning less than Rs. 400 per month. The data available for the period 1958 to 1974 are given in Table 1.5. Indices of real earnings are also given in the same table. The graph (see Graph 10) does not show any trend in real wages.

Indices of money and real wages based on both per capita and hourly basis have been computed from the data available from Sample Survey of Manufacturing Industries (1951-1958) and Annual Survey of Industries (Factory Sector: 1959-1976). The data are presented in Table 1.6. Graph 11 shows the movement of money wages and Graph 12 shows the trend in real wages and NNP per capita. The real wages and NNP per capita increased with fluctuations and moved in a broadly similar way. Graph 13 gives the movement of real wage indices and consumer price index for industrial workers. The fluctuations in real wages are opposite to fluctuations in consumer price index. The results of regressions show that money wages of workers adjust slowly to consumer prices.

Table 1.7 gives indices of wage rates of agricultural labourers based on Agricultural and Rural Labour Inquiries. The real wages had fallen during 1950/51 to 1956/57. They went up during 1956/57 to 1964/65 and then started falling during 1964/65 and 1974/75. The real wage levels


TREND IN WAGES OF WORKERS EARNING LESS THAN RS.200 P.M


TREND IN WAGES OF WORKERS EARNING LESS THAN RS.400 P.M


TREND IN MONEY WAGES OF WORKERS IN INDUSTRY 1951-1976


TREND IN REAL WAGES OF WORKERS IN INDUSTRY 1951-1976

in 1956/57, 1964/65 and 1974/75 were lower as compared to wage levels in 1950/51. Trend in wage rates of agricultural labour by State between 1970 and 1979 are given in Table 1.8. The data have been collected from Agricultural Situation in India published by the Ministry of Agriculture. Real wages had fallen in Assam, Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh, Karnatakas, Punjab and Tamilnadu.

The estimates of the parameter for different periods are given in the following pages. When P is not significant and the estimated value of λ greater than unity (amount to estimating an auto regressive scheme), the implied assumption in the Koyek transformation is not valid in that particular situation and hence we will not give the speed of adjustment statistic for that period.

PART - II

Sources of Wage Statistics

Wage statistics in India are mainly collected under statutory and nonstatutory systems. Under the first system the furnishing of necessary wage data to the specified agencies is mandatory on the part of the primary units under various enactments. In other system, the wage statistics are collected through ad hoc surveys and studies conducted from time to time on voluntary basis. Wages and related statistics are collected under the following statutory provisions:

- (1) The payment of wages Act, 1936;
- (2) The collection of statistics Act, 1953 (Annual Survey of Industries);
- (3) The Minimum Wages Act, 1948;
- (4) The Mines Act, 1952; and
- (5) Other Acts to administer other labour laws.

The Labour Bureau and NSSO has conducted the following surveys under which data on wages etc. were collected:

- (1) Agricultural and Rural Labour Enquiries;
- (2) Occupational Wage Surveys;
- (3) Survey of Labour Conditions;
- (4) Intensive Type of studies on rural labour in india; and
- (5) National Sample Surveys.

The wage statistics available in India are discussed under the following heads:

- (1) The minimum wages in India;
- (2) Agricultural wages and earnings;
- (3) Industrial wages and earnings;

- (4) Earnings of workers in mines; and
- (5) Other wages and earnings.

The Minimum Wages in India

The Minimum Wages Act, 1948 empowers appropriate Governments to fix and revise the minimum wage rates of workers in scheduled employments specified in part I or part II of the schedule, or any employment subsequently added thereto. Each Government (Central, State, or Union Territory) submits its quarterly/annual report on the working of the Minimum Wages Act to the Labour Bureau. Among other aspects, the report also contains information on minimum wage rates fixed or revised in any scheduled employment by an appropriate Government during the Quarter/years. Minimum wages need not be fixed in respect of an employment in a state if it employs less than 100 workers. There is also a provision in the Act which empowers the appropriate government to extend the application of the Act to any other employment they consider it proper.

The minimum wages have been fixed in 124 employments by Central, State and Union Territory Governments till 31st December, 1976. The detailed data are available with Ministry of Labour and in Indian Labour Statistics published by Labour Bureau. Agriculture is included in the scheduled employment under the Minimum Wages Act. Table 2.1 gives the minimum agricultural wages fixed in different states as of January 1978. Table 3.3 gives the range of minimum wages fixed under the Minimum Wages Act, 1948 by various States/Union Territories for lowest daily paid unskilled male workers (excludes employments where wages were fixed on monthly or piece rate basis) as on December 31, 1977. Table 3.1 shows minimum wages

(Basic + Dearness Allowance) prevailing in industries/sectors. Table 3.2 gives minimum emoluments of employees in selected industries/undertakings in the organised sector as in January 1978. In table 3.4 the minimum wages per month (Basic + D.A.) of Central and State government employees as of January 1978 are given. Table 3.5 shows total emoluments per month of peon, driver, clerk and steno at the minimum and maximum of the scales in different organisations as of June 1977.

Agricultural Wages and Earnings:

Periodic enquiries into agricultural wages in India began as early as the 1850's and regular collection of such data started in 1880 in all parts of India. Nilakantha Rath¹³ gave a detailed historical account of the various schemes for collection of agricultural wage-data. D. Bhattacharya¹² gave wage data for agricultural labourer and others for the period 1873-1900 in his article Trend of Wages in India (1873-1900), published in Artha Vijnana, September 1965. The bulk of the data given in this article was taken from the official publication, Prices and Wages in India¹⁰. The money and real wage indices based on this data are given in Table 1.1 K.L. Dutta⁵ rejected bulk of the data compiled in Prices and Wages in India as unreliable because he felt the method of compilation was faulty and it was difficult to count the remuneration of agricultural labourers paid partly at least in kind. Various moves between 1911 to 1919 to evolve a uniform and reliable method of collection of wage data failed in 1919 and each province followed its own method and the publication of prices and wages in India was stopped in 1923. After that, published data in one form or the other was available only for a few provinces, like C.P. and Berar, Bombay (annual data) and Punjab (Quinquennial data). S.C. Chaturvedi

in his report on Rural Wages in the United Provinces in 1947, used mostly the unpublished data available from the Quinquennial wage - enquiries of U.P. N.Rath and R.V. Joshi¹¹ obtained wage data for skilled, unskilled and field labour for Bombay presidency for the years 1924 to 1940, from the annual Administration Reports of the Bombay Presidency. Annual averages for the three divisions of the presidency as well as for the presidency as a whole, were collected from published reports. In the absence of cost-of-living data, price indices of Jowar and Bajra for the years 1924 to 1940 (1924=100) for the three divisions and the whole province were used to see the movements of wages in relation to prices. (In the article only graphs are given, the supporting data are not available). In each of the three divisions as well as in the whole presidency, the decline in wages during the period from around 1928-1931 was not as sharp as the prices of Jowar and Bajra. The decline in wages was considerable and the decline continued long after the decline in prices ceased. Thereafter the wages started recovering slowly. The adjustment of wage level to the low price level was slow. The price level began to raise above the wage-level since 1938. The continuous lag of agricultural wages behind prices during 1911 to 1944 was also observed by Chaturvedi on the basis of the quinquennial wage-data for United Provinces. After 1944, he found the raise in wages was less than the raise in prices in U.P.

After 1950, the data on agricultural wages are available mainly from the following four sources:

- (1) Agricultural wages in India (AWI).
- (2) Agricultural and Rural Labour Enquiries
- (3) National Sample Surveys (NSS)
- (4) Studies in Farm Management

Statistics regarding agricultural wages are compiled by the Directorate of Economics and Statistics (DES) published annually in Agricultural Wages in India. It gives agricultural wages for carpenter, blacksmith, cobbler, field labour, other agricultural labour and herdsman for each month of the agricultural year (July-June) for selected centers in all states. Statistics for the latest two months for some important centres in different states are being published in DES's, monthly publication - Agricultural Situation in India: The data relate to causally employed labour on a daily wage rate and paid either in kind or cash. A day is normally taken of 8 working hours. For the unskilled labour, wages are shown separately for men, women and children. For skilled labour wage rates are given only for men. Since 1948, the data are being collected monthly and wages reported are the ones most prevailing during the month. The data collected through the Patwaris, president of Panchayat Boards etc. is first consolidated at the district and then at the state headquarters. The data is collected from all the districts and at least one representative village is selected from each district.

The utility of the data is limited. There is no uniformity about the measuring of the term most prevailing during the month. V.M. Rao¹⁵ examined the reliability of the AWI data by comparing it with NSS and Farm Management Studies data. He found that the data contained errors in relation to both the level and seasonal variation on account of the limited number of centers selected for collection of data in different states. He also found a significant cases of negligent reporting. His analyses further indicated that, despite some systematic errors, the AWI data would still be useful in research investigations, particularly in those involving

qualitative hypotheses about the behaviour of agricultural wages, cross-sectionally or over time.

The data from ANI, for male field labour, for the period 1956/57 to 1971/72 by state was summarised by A.V. Jose¹⁶. The money and real wage rates compiled by him are reproduced in table 2.11. Data available for the latest two months from Agricultural situation in India are given in table 2.2 (a) & (b). Table 2.2 (c) gives money and real wage rates of male agricultural field labour in July 1970 and a latest month.

Statistics of earnings of persons as wage-paid labour in agriculture are collected periodically through the Agricultural/Rural Labour Enquiries. Four such enquiries have been conducted by the Labour Bureau in 1950/51, 1956/57, 1963/65 and 1974/75. The first and second enquiries covered agricultural labour only while the third and fourth enquiries were integrated with the 19th and 29th rounds of the NSS respectively and covered the entire rural labour. Only summary report of the Rural Labour Enquiry, 1974/75 has been released so far and an independent report on wages and earnings is expected to be released shortly. The data collected through these enquiries correspond to a full year. For the purpose of comparative study with the earlier enquiries, separate estimates in respect of agricultural labour households were produced in third and fourth enquiries.

The essential wage data from the four enquiries are presented in table 2.3 to 2.10 and 2.15 to 2.17. State-wise wage data from the fourth Agriculture and Rural Labour Enquiry are not yet available. Hence NSS data from the 25th round (1970/71) for male workers between 15-44 years belonging to rural non-cultivating households are given in Tables 2.6 to 2.8 and 2.15 to 2.17 to show the trend in wages in different states.

Tables 2.12, 2.13 and 2.18 are based on NSS 25th round. Table 2.12 gives state-wise average rates of earnings separately from farm and non-farm occupations of males and females in different age groups belonging to weaker sections of the rural population. Tables 2.13 and 2.14 give state-wise average rates of earnings per man-day in agriculture and other activities per men and women in the age group 15-59 years belonging to small cultivator and non-cultivator wage earner households. Table 2.18 gives ratio of earnings per man-day of small cultivator households to non-cultivating wage earner agricultural labour households.

Wages of hired labour are also available from the various studies undertaken by Ministry of food and agriculture in Economics of Farm Management. Table 2.19 gives available wage data for different states. Average daily wages of causal labourers in rural areas in agricultural and non-agricultural operations, mode of payment, cash and kind and period of wage payments were collected in intensive type of studies on rural labour in India in Fourth plan in 20 selected areas over all the states.

Industrial Wages and Earnings

There are scattered studies on the movement of industrial wages relating to particular periods after 1830. Buchanan remarked that all wages were doubled during the period 1830 to 1860 and there was no significant change in wages in cotton and jute mills during 1860 to 1873. He further remarked that there was slight raise in factory wages during 1873 to 1895. Since these figures are in money terms and this period (1830-1895) also witnessed considerable increase in prices, it is difficult to be sure of the real income position of the workers. For the period 1897 to 1912, the real wage indicies (1892=100) provided by K.L. Dutta⁵

are given in table 1.2. Table 1.3 gives money and real wage indices (1909-13 = 100) for industrial centres for the period 1914 to 1935. These indices were computed by Ramgopal Agarwala⁸ from the data given by S.P. Saksena⁹. Saksena gave year by year figures of money wages and cost of living indices for different industrial centres for the period 1914-1935. Agarwala took simple average of wage rates of all the industrial centres within a province to represent that province. These provincial indices were combined using the weights of employment in different states. The employment figures were the average daily number of workers employed by different industries in different states in 1935 as given in the Statistical Abstract of British India, 14th issue.

From 1940, industrial wage data are available mainly from the following sources:

- (1) The payment of Wages Act, 1936
- (2) Census of Manufacturing Industries (CMI)
- (3) Sample Survey of Manufacturing Industries (SSMI)
- (4) Annual Survey of Industries (ASI)

The Payment of Wages Act, 1936:

Statistics of earnings of factory workers are collected under the Act on annual basis by various states and Union Territories. Under the Act figures are separately collected for total earnings (before deductions) of employees covered by the Act and the corresponding average daily number of employees. Per capita annual earnings are derived by dividing the former by the latter. Earnings include wages, cash-allowances, annual bonus, arrears and money value of concessions. Till 1963 the Act was applicable to all factories as defined under section 2 (m) of the Factories Act, 1948, in

factories which employ 10 or more workers using power and 20 or more workers not using power. In 1964, the coverage of the Act was extended to the factories notified under section 85 of the factories Act, 1984. However, due to an incomplete response from section 85 factory, it has not been found possible so far to include this information. The statistics are based on the factories submitting returns and no adjustment has been made for non-response. During the period 1939 to 1964, data were collected for employees earning less than Rs200 per month. On April, 1958, the Act was extended to include all employees earning less than Rs.400 per month. However, returns were collected for both the groups during 1958-64. The payment of wages Act further amended in 1976 to cover all employees earning less than Rs 1000 per month. The data exclude railway workshops and groups of industries that are seasonal in character comprising of food, beverages, tobacco and cotton ginning and pressing but include defence installations. Returns from the year 1971 contained the details as per National Industrial Classification of 1970.

The data are supplied to Labour Bureau by States and Union Territories. Average annual earnings of workers classified by industry and state are generated from the data and then real earnings are computed and published in Indian Labour Statistics and Indian Labour Yearbook. Per capita daily earnings by State and industry calculated from these returns are initially published in Indian Labour Journal. Tables 1.4, 1.5, 3.19 (a) & (b), 3.20 and 3.25 to 3.27 give essential wage data under the payment of Wages Act, 1936.

The data suffer from the following limitations: -

- (1) All the factories do not comply with the provisions of the Act and the non-response vary from year to year which hampers comparability of data over time.
- (2) Considerable time-lag in the submission of the returns

- (3) Lack of proper understanding of the various concepts and definitions at the reporting as well as the consolidation stage/
- (4) The most serious limitation is the coverage of the data limited to workers earning less than Rs200 per month upto 1964, Rs.400 per month during 1958 to 1975 and Rs. 1000 per month after 1976. These workers are only a portion of the total work force. This portion has declined over time and hence the wage data are not comparable over time. Also the data has not been consistent in its coverage of fringe benefits which increased over time significantly.

Census of Manufacturing Industries (CMI)

An annual census of 29 out of 63 manufacturing industry groups was started in 1946 under the provision of the Industrial Statistics Act, 1942 and the Census of Manufacturing Industries (CMI) Rules, 1945 framed thereunder. The CMI covered all establishments employing 20 or more workers on any day and using power. The average annual earnings for worker calculated from this data for 1950 and 1956 are given in table 3.16. The Industrial Statistics Act, 1942 was replaced in 1956 by the collection of Statistics Act, 1953. The CMI was continued on a voluntary basis for the years 1957 and 1958. The ASI replaced the CMI from 1959.

Sample Survey of Manufacturing Industries (SSMI)

From the year 1949 onwards a sample survey of manufacturing industries was conducted on a voluntary basis in respect of 63 groups. It covered in a sample survey establishments employing 20 or more working not using power and 10 or more workers usong power. SSMI was also replaced by ASI in 1959. Indices of money and real earnings given in table 1.6 for the period 1950

to 1958 have been constructed on the basis of this data.

Annual Survey of Industries (ASI)

The more comprehensive source of earnings data is The Annual Survey of Industries. It is conducted in two parts: (i) The census sector covers all establishments employing 50 or more workers and using power and those employing 100 or more workers and not using power; (ii) The sample sector covers units employing 10 to 49 works and using power and the units employing 20 to 99 workers and not using power. Number of workers and other persons employed are available separately. Manhours worked by workers, wages of workers and salaries of others are separately available. Money value of benefits or privileges given to employees is not separately available for workers and others. In our calcualtions of per capita annual earnings, we have divided total money value of benefits between workers and others in proportion to total wages and salaries. Table 3.8 shows the disparities in average monthly earnings in selected industries/sectors in 1975/76. Tables 3.9 and 3.10 give the money earnings (state-wise) of workers in ASI factory sector. Indices of money earnings in the ASI factory sector for the period 1959 to 1976/77 are given in table 3.11. Table 3.13 gives indices of real earnings of workers per manhour for the same period. These indices were obtained by deflating the money wage indices by the correspnding consumer price indices given in tables 3.12 (a) & (b). State-wise money earnings per worker and their indices (1970 = 100) for the period 1970 to 1976/77 are given in table 3.14 Table 3.15 gives state-wise real earnings per worker based on table 3.14. Tables 3.16 to 3.18 (b) give state-wise money and real wage trends in CMI and ASI census sector during the period 1950 to 1974/75. Tables 3.12 to 3.24 give details of money earnings per worker by broad industry group in ASI factory sector during the period 1959 to 1976/77. Tables 3.29 (a) & (b) and 3.30 (a) & (b) show trends in money and real earnings of workers in

cotton and jute textile industries during the period 1900 to 1976/77.

The disparities in earnings of workers in the organised and small scale sectors of various industries in 1971/72 are shown in table 3.6. Average wage rates of workers and artisans in the unorganised sector during 1976 are presented in table 3.7. Distribution of workers population receiving dearness allowance according to basis of payment is given in table 3.31. Dearness allowance formula adopted in certain major industries are given in table 3.32. Tables 3.33 to 3.41 give industry-wise (at 3 digit level) details of wage trends in ASI sample and census sectors of the manufacturing Industry.

Earnings of Workers in Mines

Statistics of earnings of workers in mines are collected and maintained by the Director-General of Mines safety under the Mines Act, 1952. For coal mines, statistics of per capita weekly earnings are available on monthly basis. For other mines average daily earnings in December are available for every year till 1960. For the period 1961-65 the earnings in non-coal mines relate to the complete year and not to December alone. From 1966, these data were taken from the quarterly returns. The monthly returns on coal mines give daily attendances, total average wages and other payments made in cash for work done for any complete working week of the month. The per capita weekly cash earnings are then computed by dividing the total payments by the average daily employment during the week. In respect of non-coal mines also the procedure adopted is similar. Based on these statistics, the Director General of Mines Safety compiles different series of index number of money earnings for workers employed in different mining industry on base December 1951=100. The data are published in the Indian Labour Statistics and Statistics of Mines in India, Table 2.3 gives the Index of money and real earnings of employees in mines with base 1961=100 for the period 1961 to 1973.

Other Wages and Earnings:

The Labour Bureau has been conducting periodically Occupational Wage Surveys on a sample basis in selected manufacturing, mining and plantation industries. So far two such surveys have been conducted, one during 1958/59 and the other during 1963/65. The establishments covered by the survey accounted for 75 percent of the employment in factories, practically the whole of employment in plantations, and about 85 percent of employment in mines. In addition to basic data required for building up index number of wage rates for major manufacturing, mining and plantation industries, and information relating to wage components of workers in different occupations in various industries required for study of wage differentials, details of production and incentive bonuses in operation have also been collected in wage surveys. Data were collected on occupational wage rates and payroll earnings by various components of sampled workers in each occupation for a particular pay period. Table 5.1 gives occupational wage differentials in two surveys. The results of the third occupational survey are not yet available.

The Labour Bureau has been conducting periodical surveys on labour conditions in various industries mainly with a view to obtain a precise picture of the existing conditions and problems of labour. For the purpose the detailed data on earnings are also collected under the factories Act 1948 for production and other categories of workers. However, in the surveys conducted during the period 1965/66, earnings data in respect of production workers were not collected as the data were available through the second occupational survey. So far about 49 industries have been covered. Data on wages have also been collected under the contract Labour Survey. The

data on basic wage, dearness allowance, other cash allowances, money value of concessions, bonus etc. have been collected. The data, however, relate to a particular period and are for workers covered under the Factories Act. So far about 21 industries have been covered.

National Sample Surveys are the other source of wage data. A list of NSS reports on wage data are given in Appendix 2. The data on earnings are summarised in tables 5.2 to 5.6.

The data on wages in construction are available in Prices of Building Materials and Wage Rates for Building Labourers published by the National Building organisation. Some wage data from Ministry of Labour relating to construction labour are given in tables 5.7 and 5.8. Data on wages and earnings of workers in mines, plantations, railways, ports and telegraphs, docks etc. are published in Indian Labour Year Book. Wages and earnings of workers in coal mines and cotton textile mills are also available in Indian Labour Journal. The data on wages and salaries of workers in government and public sector are given in tables 4.1 to 4.5.

Main articles and books referred in the preparation of this paper are given in the reference. Appendix 1 gives a list of articles and books on wages in India.
